ESTHER AGREES TO HELP THE JEWS; VS. 1-17

Est 4:1 When Mordecai learned all that had happened, <u>he tore his clothes</u> and put on sackcloth and ashes, and went out into the midst of the city. He cried out with a loud and bitter cry. Est 4:2 He went as far as the front of the king's gate, for no one might

Est 4:2 He went as far as the front of the king's gate, for no one might enter the king's gate clothed with sackcloth.

Est 4:3 And in <u>every province</u> where the king's command and decree arrived, there was <u>great mourning among the Jews</u>, with fasting, weeping, and wailing; and many lay in sackcloth and ashes.

Est 4:4 So Esther's maids and eunuchs came and told her, and the queen was deeply distressed. Then she sent garments to clothe Mordecai and take his sackcloth away from him, but he would not accept them.

Est 4:5 Then Esther called Hathach, one of the king's eunuchs whom he had appointed to attend her, and she gave him a command concerning Mordecai, to learn what and why this was.

Est 4:6 So Hathach went out to Mordecai in the city square that was in front of the king's gate.

Est 4:7 And Mordecai <u>told him all that had happened to him</u>, and the sum of money that Haman had promised to pay into the king's treasuries to destroy the Jews.

Est 4:8 <u>He also gave him a copy of the written decree for their</u> <u>destruction</u>, which was given at Shushan, that he might show it to Esther and explain it to her, and that <u>he might command her to go in to the king</u> to make supplication to him and plead before him for her people.

Est 4:9 So Hathach returned and told Esther the words of Mordecai. Est 4:10 Then Esther spoke to Hathach, and gave him a command for Mordecai:

Est 4:11 "All the king's servants and the people of the king's provinces know that any man or woman who goes into the inner court to the king, who has not been called, he has but <u>one law: put all to death</u>, except the one to whom the king holds out the golden scepter, that he may live. Yet I myself <u>have not been called to go in to the king these thirty days."</u> Est 4:12 So they told Mordecai Esther's words.

Est 4:13 And Mordecai told them to answer Esther: <u>"Do not think in</u> your heart that you will escape in the king's palace any more than all the other Jews.

Est 4:14 For if you remain completely silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise for the Jews from another place, but you and your father's house will perish. Yet who knows whether you have come to the kingdom <u>for such a time as this?"</u>

vs. 1-3 Understandably there is mourning and weeping, wailing and fasting concerning the decree to annihilate the Jews. But there's no mention of any praying. This is what happens when we're not where we should be, when we're in a backslidden condition. The price of not praying when I'm able to pray is not being able to pray when I need to pray. It's not that the Lord turns His back on me. It's just that I'm out of shape spiritually. Mordecai probably is feeling some responsibility because of his refusing to bow to Haman. His heart is broken!

v. <u>4</u> Mordecai was not interested in a cover-up. He needed a cure.

vs. 5-11 To save her honor, Vashti lost her crown. To save her people, Esther risked losing her head because the law of the land stated that whoever approached the king without an invitation risked being put to death. How thankful I am that our King welcomes us into His court at any time. "*Come unto Me all ye that labor and are heavy-laden,*" *He says (Matthew 11:28).* Therefore, we can come boldly unto His throne of grace. When? Anytime we have need (*Hebrews 4:16*). A thirty day absence period is not a good sign.

vs. 12-13 "If the Jews are destroyed, you will be, too," Mordecai said to Esther. And the same is true of us. As the body of Christ, we're linked together. We tend to associate only with those who are doing well. In reality, we ought to care equally about the person who is doing poorly because even the weakest among us affects the rest of us (*1 Corinthians 12:22–25*). Strong words for Esther—she needed to heart it!

v. 14 "Even if you choose not to step out, deliverance will come," Mordecai said to Esther. "But you'll miss a glorious opportunity. And you'll be destroyed in the process." If you're not interested in God's work, if you'd rather complain about your difficult situation or cruise in your easy one, God will still get His work done, but you'll perish, not physically, but the vibrancy of your walk, the joy of service, the opportunity and blessing of being used will be absent. "Maybe you've come into this place as queen of Persia for such a time as this," Mordecai said to Esther. And the same is true of you, dear saint. You are where you are because God is in the shadows, steering the ship of your life. God is in control and He's placed you in your location for such a time as this because there are people for you to minister to, lives for you to touch, and work for you to do. Nothing is accidental to the child of God. Even if your situation seems difficult, the Lord has you right where He wants you to be. He has you right where you are "for such a time as this," for the sake of the kingdom.

Why are we alive in this period of time? Is it not God's sovereign plan? For His purposes? To live for Him for such a time as this? Maybe not for the purpose of 15 million people but maybe just for one person? You've been made for this hour! INTRODUCTION – Even though the name of God is not mentioned in the Book of Esther, we continue to see that He is working all the time, even when we are not aware. We can see how He can turn the whole thing around in one hour!! When He does what He does, you can then look backwards and see His finger prints all along the way. Esther is a great example of this as well as being a great example of *Romans 8:28*. Haman's scheme to destroy all the Jews was given in chapter 3. We closed that chapter with the statement that the city of Shushan was perplexed. Haman is on top of the world, but he doesn't realize that he has signed his own death warrant in attempting to destroy the Jews. Esther does not yet realize what has happened.

FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS! - Chapter 4; Seventeen years before the story before us began, the Jews were given a golden opportunity by king Cyrus when he told them they were free to return to Jerusalem to rebuild the temple, restore the worship, and renew the nation. And yet amazingly only a handful of the Jews took up the offer to step up and move out. Although approximately 60,000 responded to the offer, the rest, millions of Jews, stayed in Babylon. Why? Perhaps some stayed because of fear and anxiety about leaving the homes they had lived in for seventy years. Others may have been overcome by lethargy at the thought of rebuilding the city. But for most, it was no doubt a question of prosperity. To leave that behind didn't make sense to the overwhelming majority. Even so, God didn't forsake them. One of the overarching themes, one of the real reasons for the Book of Esther is to let you know that if you're His child, God will never forget you. Your name is written in the palm of His hand.

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Est 4:15 Then Esther told them to reply to Mordecai: Est 4:16 "Go, gather all the Jews who are present in Shushan, and fast for me; neither eat nor drink for three days, night or day. My maids and I will fast likewise. And so I will go to the king, which is against the law; and if I perish, I perish!"	vs. 15-16. The story is told that, after receiving some advice from Augustine, a young man asked him why he was telling him to stay away from this and to avoid that. "I have to live, don't I?" "Do you?" Augustine is said to have replied. "I die daily," Paul said (<i>1 Corinthians 15:31</i>). "If I perish, I perish," Esther concluded. "If any man come after Me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow Me," Jesus declared (<i>Matthew 16:24</i>).	
Est 4:17 So Mordecai went his way and did according to all that Esther commanded him. <u>ESTHER'S BANQUET; VS. 1-8</u>	v. 17 "If I perish, I perish. If I go down, I go down. If it's such a time for this that I exist, I'm going to go for it." What are we afraid of? That someone won't like us, that someone will make fun of us? So what? They're doing that anyway! May we be those who share Esther's commitment and clarity.	
Est 5:1 Now it happened <u>on the third day</u> that Esther put on her royal robes and stood in the inner court of the king's palace, across from the king's house, while the king sat on his royal throne in the royal house, facing the entrance of the house. Est 5:2 So it was, when the king saw Queen Esther standing in the court, that she found favor in his sight, and the king held out to Esther the golden scepter that was in his hand. Then Esther went near and touched the top of the scepter. Est 5:3 And the king said to her, "What do you wish, Queen Esther? What is your request? It shall be given to you—up to half the kingdom!" Est 5:4 So Esther answered, "If it pleases the king, let the king and Haman come today to the banquet that I have prepared for him." Est 5:5 Then the king said, " <u>Bring Haman quickly, that he may do as Esther has said.</u> " So the king and Haman went to the banquet that Ests 5:6 At the banquet of wine the king said to Esther, "What is your petition? It shall be granted you. What is your request, up to half the kingdom? It shall be done!"	 ws.1-3 Proverbs 21:1 says the king's heart is in the hand of the Lord. As Esther is granted access to the king, we see again that God is behind the scenes, setting things up, working things out w.4 Esther risked her life to invite the king to dinner. Our King, on the other hand, laid down His life so that we might dine with Him forever (Revelation 19:9). ws.5-6 Notice that Esther was to make her request at the banquet of the wine. I have found that the place I can most freely make my request and pour out my heart is at the Lord's Table as I hold the wine of His blood in my hand for it is there that I am reminded once again of how much He loves me. Esther does not choose to accuse Haman publicly. Also putting the king in an uncomfortable position. Tremendous wisdom! It now appears something much different for Haman than what will occur! 	

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Est 5:7 Then Esther answered and said, "My petition and request is this: Est 5:8 If I have found favor in the sight of the king, and if it pleases the king to grant my petition and fulfill my request, then let the king and Haman come to the banquet which I will prepare for them, and <u>tomorrow</u> I will do as the king has said."

HAMAN'S PLOT AGAINST MORDECAI; VS. 9-14

Est 5:9 So Haman went out that day joyful and with a glad heart; but when Haman saw Mordecai in the king's gate, and that he did not stand or tremble before him, he was filled with indignation against Mordecai. Est 5:10 Nevertheless <u>Haman restrained himself</u> and went home, and he sent and called for his friends and his wife Zeresh. Est 5:11 Then Haman told them of <u>his great riches</u>, the multitude of his children, everything in <u>which the king had promoted him</u>, and how he had advanced him above the officials and servants of the king. Est 5:12 Moreover Haman said, "Besides, Queen Esther invited no one but me to come in with the king to the banquet that she prepared; and tomorrow I am again invited by her, along with the king. Est 5:13 Yet all this avails me nothing, so long as I see Mordecai the Jew sitting at the king's gate."

Est 5:14 Then <u>his wife Zeresh and all his friends said</u> to him, "Let a gallows be made, fifty cubits high, and in the morning suggest to the king that Mordecai be hanged on it; <u>then go merrily</u> with the king to the banquet." And <u>the thing pleased Haman; so he had the gallows made.</u>

THE KING HONORS MORDECAI!" VS. 1-14

Est 6:1 That <u>night the king could not sleep.</u> So one was <u>commanded to</u> <u>bring the book of the records of the chronicles; and they were read before</u> the king.

Est 6:2 And it was <u>found written that Mordecai had told</u> of Bigthana and Teresh, two of the king's eunuchs, the doorkeepers who had sought to lay hands on King Ahasuerus.

Est 6:3 Then the king said, "What honor or dignity has been bestowed on Mordecai for this?" And the king's servants who attended him said, "Nothing has been done for him."

Est 6:4 So the king said, "Who is in the court?" Now Haman had just entered the outer court of the king's palace to suggest that the king hang Mordecai on the gallows that he had prepared for him.

Est 6:5 The king's servants said to him, "Haman is there, standing in the court." And the king said, "<u>Let him come in."</u>

vs. 7-8 What's happening here? Twice Esther is given the opportunity to say what's on her heart, but it seems as if she hedges both times. More than likely, however, Esther sensed the timing to make her request was not right. There is a moment of the miraculous, a moment when the time is right to move in the authority and power of God. We have the power, for example, to pray for the sick and to see them restored. The power has been given to us, but we have to wait until the authority is also present. In other words, two components need to come together: power and permission. Many times we, as believers, mistakenly think we can randomly move in the arena of the miraculous. We have been given the power, yes, but we must wait for the authority, the timing that's right. Esther seemingly understood this. v. 9 Haman thought he had hit the jackpot. After all, he had been invited to two private parties hosted by less than Esther, the queen. No wonder he left happy. that he did not stand or tremble before him, he was filled with indignation against Mordecai. Haman had just been in the presence of the king and queen. He had a lot going for him. But he was immediately incensed because a "little man" named Mordecai didn't acknowledge him. I believe you can take an accurate measure of someone's character by the size of the things that bug him. What does it take to irritate you? We're the bride of Christ. We're welcomed into the presence of the King. Why, then, are we so quickly and easily bugged when someone doesn't acknowledge us or when we experience a situation doesn't go our way?

vs. 10-13. "Even though I am second in command, I can't enjoy my riches or power because Mordecai won't bow down to me," Haman said. Haman has an "T' problem! Just think of Haman's great honor and recognition and how all that is wiped out by one little person not bowing down to him! **v. 14** "Curse God and die," Job's wife advised him (Job 2:9). Job wisely resisted this advice and he was rewarded (Job 42:10). "Build a gallows tall enough to make a public spectacle of Mordecai," Haman's wife and friends said. And Haman foolishly listened—to his own peril. The gallows could be seen from perhaps the whole city!

vs. 1-2 Notice how easily God can just take away the ability to sleep of the strongest man in the world? God's will, will be done! In all of this is the fingerprints of God! What are the odds that the historian would pick this very event? As Xerxes reads that Mordecai actually saved his life, it becomes clear to us why Esther didn't sense permission to make her request before this.

<u>vs. 3-5</u> In Before Haman could bring his request to hang Mordecai, the king had something else to talk to him about... What are the odds of Haman just showing up early for work? – to present his plan of hanging Mordecai.

Vs. 9 Malice: Isn't it interesting how that something can get under our skin, and irritate us, and we just seem to forget all of the glorious blessings that God's given us, because we've allowed some little irritant to just be there, and it keeps us from enjoying all that God has done, and all that God has provided. Oh, <u>God, help us not to lose that joy</u> <u>because of some irritant.</u>

<u>Chap. 6:1</u> *That night the king could not sleep.* A Godinspired insomnia. I do believe that there is God-inspired insomnia. I believe that the Lord wakes me up on many occasions at night. And if I do wake up in the night, I just say, "Lord, is there someone in need, special need? Someone in trouble? And I use the time for intercessory prayer. And I think that God has awakened me; just maybe He wants some fellowship. And so, I always use that time at night, rather than cursing my sleeplessness, to just spend it with God, and it becomes precious time well spent in intercessory prayer, and just worship and praise and memorizing Scripture.

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Est 6:6 So Haman came in, and the king asked him, "What shall be done for the man whom the king delights to honor?" Now Haman thought in his heart, " <u>Whom would the king delight to honor more than me?</u> " Est 6:7 And Haman answered the king, "For the man whom the king delights to honor, Est 6:8 let <u>a royal robe</u> be <u>brought which the king has worn</u> , and a <u>horse on which the king has ridden</u> , which <u>has a royal crest placed</u> on its head.	vs. 6-9 "Wow, what an open door.
